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Open the Doors

"Open the doors to the Spirit, to one another, and to our neighbors."

Charlie Brown, our Senior Warden.

Charlie offered this lovely phrase as a guiding principle to the Vestry at our February retreat. It has been an energizing and clarifying compass point for the vestry as we are discerning our priorities for the year. Often as things go with the Spirit, we just received an invitation from our diocese for Christ Church to participate in the "Faithful Innovation Process" pilot program. This dovetails nicely with our desire to open the doors to the Spirit, to one another, and to our neighbors.

The invitation from The Rev. Cannon Blair Pogue, Missioner for Vitality and Innovation, Episcopal Church in Minnesota:

"Faithful Innovation is a process that invites participants to engage in simple spiritual practices and small



experiments to develop deeper relationships with God, fellow faith community members, and neighbors.

During seasons when your congregation feels stuck, overwhelmed, and doesn't know what to do, these practices deepen participants' faith and curiosity about God's activity outside the church, and create muscle memory for a process they can engage in repeatedly. Rather than focusing inward on church questions, Faithful Innovation invites participants to focus outward, to be curious about where God is already at work in your community.

Guiding teams of 3-8 lay leaders from participating faith communities and their clergy will gather three Saturdays over a 9-month period, work with a coach to process learnings, then envision and enact small experiments to learn more about what the Holy

Spirit is up to in the lives of their neighbors."

The deadline for registration is May 23. Christ Church will cover the participation fee.

Gathering dates in Faribault, MN: 10 a.m.-3 p.m. - Saturdays, July 23, 2022, Nov 12, 2022, and April 1, 2023.

Two stories of "small experiments" by past participating churches:

- ☼ A rural church in Wisconsin recognized that the planting and harvesting season was an important rhythm in their community. Several women on the hospitality team, decided to set up a hospitality table at the Farm Co-op at harvest time, offering coffee, hot chocolate, and bars. One of the
- women offered to pray for the farmers' crops, and to the surprise of many, the farmers welcomed the prayers. One farmer even extended an invitation for them to come and pray for his field at planting-time, the next spring.
- Another church noticed that neighborhood youth were gathering outside their church building on their way home from school. They discovered that the youth were using the church's WIFI. So, the church set up picnic

tables and chairs to make the youth feel welcomed, and some of the members spent time getting to know the youth.

These stories inspired our vestry to vote YES for Christ Church to participate in the Faithful Innovation Process pilot program. If this sounds interesting to you, or maybe you feel the nudge of the Spirit to say yes, please contact Letha at priest@ChristChurchRW.org. Each of you is invited into this opportunity. All are welcome, 16 yrs. and older. We need 3-8 people for our team, the more we have the better. Whether you've been coming to Christ Church for a couple months or for your entire lifetime, you are invited in!

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
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May is Mental Health Month: Thoughts on Depression

May is finally here and the hope of spring is in the air. May is also Mental Health Month. I thought I'd share some thoughts with you about Depression this month. Depression refers to feelings of sadness, isolation, discouragement, or hopelessness that persists. It is a serious illness which affects a person physically, emotionally, spiritually, socially, and vocationally. Depression is not something to be ignored. It is common in older people as we age and deal with life changes that are often difficult to accept.



The following are common symptoms of depression. If you experience 4 or more of these symptoms for longer than 2 weeks, or if your symptoms interfere with your daily life, you may be experiencing depression. If you have any concerns about depression, please visit with your medical team. There is also a 24/7 Helpline you can call at 1-888-727-5945. If it is a crisis, you can call 1-888-727-7472 or text 741741

- Ongoing feeling of sadness, anxiety, or emptiness
- Loss of interest in usual activities
- Feelings of hopelessness, helplessness, or pessimism
- Feelings of worthlessness or guilt
- Difficulty sleeping or eating
- Decreased energy, persistent fatigue
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering, and making decisions
- Thoughts of death or suicide

Depression can be effectively treated in several different ways. The vast majority of people with depression recover and lead meaningful and productive lives. Often depression is situational based on what you are experiencing in your life currently as a new health diagnosis or loss of a loved one. Both medications and counseling or psychotherapy are used in the treatment o depression. It is also very important for family and friends to recognize the symptoms of depression and encourage treatment for person



suffering from depression.

Healing Task Force: A Letter to the Vestry

A letter from the Healing Task Force to the Vestry, approved by the Vestry on April 25, 2022.

We are writing to you today with what we see as an important request that we believe will assist in the healing process as it pertains to clergy misconduct within our parish.

The Healing Task Force was formed to help assist the members of Christ Church understand the process regarding clergy misconduct and to ascertain what we could do to assist with a path that leads toward healing. Throughout this process, we have learned a great deal regarding different ways to assist members of Christ Church that are struggling with past clergy misconduct.

We have learned that these photographs have, for some of our congregation members, triggered emotional distress.

We have listened to the concerns of the congregation and have received guidance and assistance from the diocese from both

Bishop Loya and Robin Hammeal-Urban (the consultant who worked with us, with 20 years of experience helping congregations in the Diocese of Connecticut heal in the wake of clergy misconduct.)

Although the healing process is different for all members of Christ Church, one concern that we believe could be addressed quickly is the placement of the photographs of past clergy that are currently hanging in the hallway across from the bathrooms. We have learned that these photographs have, for some of our congregation members, triggered emotional distress.

We would like to request that the photographs of past clergy be placed in a portfolio somewhere that is accessible to all parish members and guests to view at their own discretion. The task force also discussed the possibility of hanging photos of the current Vestry members on that wall, which we think would be helpful to our congregation in recognizing another important group of people in our parish.



During the Revolutionary era, the pulpit played a key role in encouraging dissent. The political activism of these black-robed ministers earned them the name "the black robed regiment."

In fact, the British believed so strongly that it was the preaching from colonial pulpits that pushed its citizens into rebellion that many ministers had bounties put on their heads.



The Reverend James Caldwell, minister of First Presbyterian Church of Elizabethtown, New Jersey, instructed his congregation that "there are times when it is as righteous to fight as it is to pray." After the British put a bounty on his head, Caldwell went to the pulpit with two loaded flintlock pistols.

The British referred to Caldwell as the "Fighting Chaplain" and his brave leadership was immortalized in verse:

"Who's that riding in on horse-back? Parson Caldwell, boys; Hooray! Red-coats call him "Fighting Chaplain," How they hate him! Well they may!"



The Maryland Convention voted on May 25, 1776, "that every Prayer and Petition for the King's Majesty, in the book of Common Prayer .be henceforth omitted in all Churches and Chapels in this Province." The rector of Christ Church (then called Chaptico Church) in St. Mary's County, Maryland, placed over the offending passages strips of paper showing prayers composed for the Continental Congress. The petition that God "keep and strengthen in the true worshipping of thee, in righteousness and holiness of life, thy servant GEORGE, our most gracious King and Governour" was changed to a plea that "it might please thee to bless the honorable Congress with Wisdom to discern and Integrity to pursue the true Interest of the United States."

In and Around the Church



The word Episcopal means "governed by bishops". Each bishop traces his or her authority through a historical succession of bishops back to the earliest days of the Christian Church. There is no pope in the Anglican tradition; decisions are made by bishops and representative bodies such as General Convention, composed of bishops and elected laity and clergy delegates.
